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Learning through play—language, questions and provocations

Learning through play is an important part of development for children. To enhance learning, adults play alongside the children, modelling and developing language and we have vocabulary cards displayed in the different areas as well as provocation cards. Provocation cards are usually questions or ideas for children to develop their learning. The younger children may not be able to read the words or questions, but providing a language rich environment helps them develop an understanding of written communication as an important learning tool.
