Dear Parents

The children in nursery had a fun-filled and busy week doing plenty of activities around the book called 'Rosie's walk'.

We enjoyed retelling the story utilising the props on the small world shelf and playing with the finger puppets as well as masks.

We incorporated lots of positional language into our play (more than we usually do) and ended it all on a high by doing a fun obstacle course.

To tie in with the rest of the school's STEM activities this week, sieves were added to the sensory tray for the children to play with.

It was fun to observe what remained and what passed through the sieve when held at a chosen height.

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Albatross Class:

This week we have been using the text 'The Three Little Pigs' as a focus for learning in Albatross class. We have been reading the story and using small figures to retell the story. In Literacy for FS2, we have been able to use props to retell the story, wrote about the pig's houses and described the pigs.



This week in maths we have been naming 2d and 3d shapes. We have used 2d and 3d shapes to make pictures.

In Understanding the world, we have made a large house out of wooden blocks and played a board game all about The Three Little Pigs. We also used different materials to try and make wind to recreate the wolf's huffing and puffing. Then we sorted different types of materials and talked about how they look and feel.

As part of our creative learning, we have mixed the colour pink using poster paint and made pink pictures and pigs.

We all worked together to build an impressive large wooden house out of blocks that

could fit three people in.














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Caracara Class

Caracara Class have been learning how to persuade. We are writing a letter to Jack (from Jack and the Beanstalk) to say whether he should, or shouldn't, climb the beanstalk to visit the giant. Many of us think he shouldn't! In maths, year 1s are continuing to learn about numbers to 50 by grouping or partitioning them into tens and ones; year 2s are developing their understanding about mass and reading scales. We've had great fun during STEM week, designing, building and testing our houses with the aim of withstanding a flood (or at least being waterproof!).











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Falcon Class:

What a busy week we have had! The children have had an exciting time taking part in a variety of STEM activities based around the topic of 'Water'. On Monday, the children planned their house designs in groups thinking about features that would protect their homes from flash floods and rising water levels and the recycled materials that they could use to create their models. On Wednesday, we were joined by our lovely STEM volunteers Nick Shipley, John Knagg and Vickie Bailey who helped the children build their models and challenged their designs by asking probing questions about material usage, stability and design features that were and were not necessary. The children loved building and have created some superb designs. On Thursday, the children visited the MPC water treatment facility where Michael Macpherson gave them a tour of the site and explained the process that is carried out to get the water from the stream to our taps. The children asked some superb questions and were very excited to meet the resident cats Poppy & Cocoa as well as dress in the PPE gear. On Friday, we all tested our houses by recreating the flood and testing to see if the houses could withstand a days heavy downpour. Results varied but it was exciting to discuss why some failed and why others were successful. A big thank you to all of the volunteers including Sqn Ldr Merino who gave (and survived) a lovely presentation to the children about how to conserve our water and reduce consumption. Meadowlark visits Fitzroy Farm: A school camping trip to remember!

Year 5 & 6 Meadowlark had the exciting opportunity to go on an overnight camping trip with IJS (Stanley Infant & Junior School) to Fitzroy Settlement from the 13^{th} to 14^{th} March.

The whole aim of the trip was to build resilience, independence and to make and have fun with new friends. Suddenly, we did not only have four students but forty!! Upon arrival, it was all hands-on-deck as we pitched our tents in the windy conditions of the Falklands. We then went for a long, relaxing walk to the Fitzroy memorial where we sketched the beautiful landscapes and the poignant, memorial sites at Fitzroy bay. For our night-time event, Company Sergeant Major Mick Little and his men from the 1st Battalion Scots Guards turned up with 'guns, rifles and rocket-launchers, tactical gear, night vision scopes, camo lotion, rat packs' etc. - you name it, they brought and demonstrated how to use it for all the students! Everyone was so excited. The session ended with a 'spot the soldier in the darkness' game where students had to use two different types of night-time vision scopes to find three soldiers in different positions, located around the community hall.

After an eventful first day, we all went to bed, exhausted from a day of firsts and making new friends.

The following morning, we had another exciting session with two RAF adventure training instructors Corporal Fraser Harris and Sergeant Stuart Edwards. It was great to see children learning new skills; communicating and working together as a team.
