Plover Class

Knock, Knock! Who's there? Who. Who who? Are you an owl?

In Nursery this week we learned all about owls. Our focus book was 'Owl Babies'. There was so much play around it, that I may consider getting the owls out again in a few weeks! We learned that baby owl nests consist of leaves, twigs and feathers and that they fly and hunt at night. The children made stone and pinecone owls as well as little stick puppets of the main characters of the story, so you can ask them to give you a puppet show at home!

We also looked at 'Day' and 'Night' (Book: Night Monkey, Day Monkey) and created lovely pieces of art based on the sun and moon.











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Albatross Class

This week we have been using the text 'Jack and the Beanstalk' as a focus for learning in Albatross class. We have been reading the story and using small figures to retell the story. In Literacy for FS2, we have been able to use props to retell the story, ordered pictures of the story and compared the beginning and end of the story.



This week in maths we have been making patterns and comparing the length and height of objects.

In Understanding the world, we have considered how to look after plants and looked at bean seeds and different plants around school.

As part of our creative learning, we have listened to harp music, used percussion instruments to play alongside the telling of the story and made green by colour mixing yellow and blue in the tuff tray.

We have enjoyed using the park and outside areas too this week.















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Caracara Class

In English this week, Caracara Class have finished writing letters to Jack trying to persuade him to climb, or not climb, the beanstalk. The children really got involved and came up with some rather grotesque reasons! Towards the end of the week, we focused on word classes and have written senses list poems based on a picture from the book, 'Jack and the Baked Beanstalk!' The year 1s needed to focus on using an adjective, noun, verb structure; the year 2s had to add adverbs onto the end of the structure.

Under the bridge.






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Falcon Class

This week the children wrote wonderful poems about an abandoned space using powerful vocabulary. In maths, Year 4 have been writing tenths as decimals and Year 3 have been using scales to calculate the mass of objects, adding and subtracting to calculate the difference. In geography, they have looked at the Rocky Mountains in the USA and have been investigating the physical and human features that can be found there. In science, the children have completed their experiment to see if all plants need soil to survive and have concluded that seeds can initially germinate on any of the surfaces they investigated, but the plant does need soil to grow beyond a certain point.





WEAVING CLUB:

Our weavers have completed their projects for the term and I am sure that you will agree how wonderful they all are. The children showed imagination and creativity through their choice of pattern and materials. The group chose a Falkland Island scenery theme with many creating the landscape and the fabulous sunsets that we get here.









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Meadowlark Class

In maths this week, we compared and converted different metric units of measurement to solve a range of reasoning word problems.

In English, we continued to write our formal, moon-landing reports, using a range of writing devices.

In science, we investigated the effect of water resistance on a range of different plasticine shapes to find out which shape is the most streamlined.
