Plover Class

In Nursery this week our book focus was 'The Odd Egg' by Emily Gravett. The children enjoyed the story and all the activities we linked to it. The children painted balloons filled with water and all of them had different predictions of what they thought was inside:

We looked at and touched a real bird's nest and made eggs out of

getting our hair cut!


















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Albatross class:

This week in Albatross class we have been reading the book Oliver's Vegetables.





In physical development we have played a 'bean game' and have used peelers to peel fruit and vegetables.

In maths we have been naming 2d shapes and then using them to create shape pictures and continue repeating patterns.







Caracara Class:

This week we've been continuing with our learning about coronations by looking at similarities and differences between 5 different monarchs. We started in 1066 with King Harold, shown on the Bayeux Tapestry, stopping at 1559, 1661, 1953 and 2023. Can you work out which monarchs we looked at? For science, we are hoping for rain every day! We have a rain gauge to measure rainfall and have begun to record the information on daily graphs. In maths, year 1s continued to focus on capacity and year 2s are working really hard to understand fractions





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Falcon Class:

This week the children have been looking at how to stay safe around electricity and have experimented by making their own series circuits using bulbs, buzzers and motors using a range of components. They have also investigated why some circuits don't work. In history, the children have worked together to research a range of famous steam engines ready to make comparisons between them later in the term. They used IT and books to research and then created an information poster for the working wall - all in 20 minutes. In English, the children have started to write their own narrative based on the class text - Manfish and in maths, they have started their new topic of

Money, looking at how to write amounts in decimals. In art, the children have started to look at their own designs for a sculpture based on steam trains and have been researching and sketching their design.







Meadowlark Class:

In maths this week, we measured the side lengths and angles of regular and irregular polygons.

In English, we started to write our survival guides, from how to endure the harsh weather from the Falklands if you get stranded, to living on a deserted island.

In art, we designed a collage of images of the Kings' coronation to contribute to a whole school display.

In Science, we did a scratch test on a variety of different materials to test their hardness.

Finally, I would like to congratulate Eliza on completing her week-long SATs tests today. Well done Eliza!










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Maths Parent Workshop Thursday 25th May (Caracara, Falcon and Meadowlark Classes)
