Dear Parents

I can't believe it is now December and the end of term is fast approaching. The count down has certainly begun in school, with our first Christmas event occurring this afternoon where we decorate the Christmas tree. The children have been working hard throughout the school in designing, making and evaluating their decorations. Furthermore, it is great to see the progression of skills through the classes. The children will bring these home nearer the end of term, when they can be proudly hung on your own trees.

In Albatross:

In Albatross this week, our highlights have been making our decorations for the Christmas tree event today. We had to draw upon our ever increasing fine motor skills, for one activity where we had to carefully wrap wool around our template to make a beautiful hanging decoration. Some children thought it looked like a snowflake, while others thought it was like a star - although one suggestion was also a spider web! We made our own salt dough and used the cutters to cut them out. It took 6 hours for

them to cook in the oven! Once cooked, we were then able to decorate them further adding a festive touch. We also enjoyed using the stomp rocket, thinking about the forces in action. We had to 'push' on the airbag to make the rocket fly and tested doing it with more or less force, to see how this changed the result. Our favourite was jumping on the airbag as this made the rocket go so high! Outdoors, we have been creating lots of obstacle courses with anything and everything we could get our hands on! We enjoyed making them and then testing them out - it also tested our balance and coordination!

















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In Caracara:

In Caracara class we've been busy making our Christmas decorations for the school tree. The children have been learning to sew and decorate their baubles and they've all done a brilliant job! In English the children have been describing a setting, and have been working on addition and subtraction in maths.



In Falcon Class:

What a busy but fun week it has been! Play practices, singing carols and making decorations for the Christmas tree has taken most of the afternoons and the children are getting very excited to show their parents their creations this afternoon. The mornings have been busy too, with Year 4 learning all about measuring and calculating perimeters of rectangles and rectilinear shapes and Year 3 multiplying and dividing by 3. Three members of year 3 have gained their tackling tables blue multiplication and division certificates this week too, so a big well done and keep practising © Our outsider narrative stories have been completed and the class are moving onto their second piece of writing, an information text all about polar bears.

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Message from the Education Welfare Officer:

A message from your Education Welfare Officer, Jane Kelly from Defence Children's Services...

By attending school daily and on time, children learn the importance of commitment and being punctual, a life skill which will serve them well as they grow into the next generation of working citizens.

Many people think that the odd day off here and there does not matter, but even these odd days can have an impact on children's learning. Learning about any topic doesn't happen all in one day; therefore, when a child returns to school the class may be continuing their learning from the day before which will put your child at an immediate disadvantage. At the time of school assessments, it will be hard for children to achieve their best results if there are gaps in their learning.

Not being at school regularly also has a negative effect on the social aspects of school. It is hard for children to build and maintain good friendships if they are not in school regularly.

Your child has a right to an education and to be safe and happy at school. But sometimes children and young people can be anxious about going to school. This can happen for lots of reasons but can happen when they have a worry about something such as homework or a class test, or if they have had a fall out with other children.

Sometimes parents let their child stay off school because they think the school isn't handling these kinds of things well enough. Unfortunately, this will not help find a solution. It is important to talk to the school if this kind of problem happens.
