We had lots of fun playing a counting game with our friends, working on our turn taking as well as our number skills. 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Caracara Class:

Another busy week has taken place in Caracara Class. For science week, we investigated how shadows are formed and enjoyed making shadow puppets. We have started to write our information reports in English. In maths, year 2s have begun the process of developing their understanding of multiplication and how it links to repeated addition. Year 1s have been problem solving and reasoning with numbers to 50 which has proven a little more difficult than they first thought. However, they have persevered and have worked out some tricky questions. In R.E. we have been learning about the Easter story and how different artefacts linked to Easter will have different meanings for a variety of people. In D.T. we have been learning about pivot points to create a scissor action and rotary movement.

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Falcon Class:

In science this week, the children have learned about Carl Linnaeus' classification system and created their own version for a selection of animals. They then played "Guess Who" by asking classification questions to identify their partner's chosen animal. In maths, Year 3 have learned what a unit fraction is and have begun to compare and order fractions. Year 4 have been adding and subtracting mixed number fractions. In geography, the children have identified the main features of a river and looked at how the use of a river changed in each of the different sections. In RE, the children have looked at different stories of Jesus and the reason why Christians find him so inspirational. PE this week concentrated on balancing using the core muscles which proved to be a fun and challenging lesson. Hopefully, the children won't ache too much!



Meadowlark Class:

In English, we have been focussed on completing our 'Wolves' information report, learning about the purpose of features such as: headings, sub-headings, images and captions and the need for a glossary. Fractions, percentages and decimals are giving us brain busting challenges, which will continue into next week — is that a groan I hear???

Geography is one of our favourite subjects at the moment. We have been learning through asking questions, for example; 'How has the physical and human landscape changed over time and why?' 'How have humans changed the landscape and with what consequences?

We also never knew how fascinating mushrooms are until our science research into fungi!!! See below for marvellous mushroom facts.
