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Orca class

It has been an extremely busy final week in Orca class with lots of learning going on to finish our units. Our Mayan unit ended with an investigative study over 'why the civilisation declined and eventually ended'. We worked in groups to find 'evidence' that helped to back up our theories as to why the civilisation came to an end. Wonderful group work from everyone! It has been a very scientific week too as we finished off our learning about changing materials. We have one more experiment to do after the half term break but this week saw some detailed work on irreversible changes, such as burning, and an experiment about rust! The engagement in this unit has been great so well done Orca Class!











Our 'Survival Guides' also came to fruition with some very detailed written work in English. Everyone was keen to show off their 'guides' by making their own booklet. We used Publisher to create their final guide, getting to grips with text boxes, backgrounds and images!





- Search for berries and nuts or some fish such as açai (a type of fruit)
- Bring any food you find back to camp, then put it on a leaf (this can b your plate).
- 3. Place your food down and search for wood (but not damp wood) ar
- Once you have gathered all your supplies from step 3, start placing your stones in a circle shape, forming the base, and put your sticks in the middle.
- Get flint and steel (from your survival kit) and start scraping them together, away from your face and close to the wood.
- Once you have the fire, place two sticks next to the fire (but not too close) then put the container on the two sticks.
- 7. Put the water in the pot (from the first paragraph).

The final step is to put the food you have collected in the pot then take it out carefully.

Now that's how you make food in the wild!



Explorer's kit

Before you set off on your adventure, make sure you pack an explorer's kit because, when problems occur, it can help you a lot. Some suitable things to pack would be a machete because it has lots of different uses, a first aid kit and a list of emergency numbers with a fully charged phone. You could pack a torch for when it is dark. A light fold up tent would be useful because if you are in severe weather or plummeting temperatures, you can use it for shelter or warmth. A fully packed explorer's kit is crucial for your survival.

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Road Safety

BE SAFE - BE SEEN!

On Wednesday, two police officers kindly offered their time to visit school to talk with the children about 'Road Safety'. Bea (Cpl Mallinson) and James (Cpl Kirton) reminded the children of how to keep safe while out and about, either playing with friends or cycling.

As we are aware, the dark mornings and dark evenings during winter, require extra precautions to keep safe while out and about. The children listened carefully and were keen to answer questions as well as sharing their own experiences and ideas.

The following advice was shared with the children:

- High visibility clothing must be worn e.g. jacket or belt and reflective strips on helmets and shoes.
- High visibility items can be bought for bikes including the frame, wheels and peddles.
- Bike lights—white at the front and red at the back.
- Cycle on the pavement, not on the roads or gravel paths.
- Vehicles travel at 10mph around school, 20mph around the families accommodation and 30mph on the main ring road.
- Play only on the grass not by or on the road
- Use a zebra crossing to cross the road.
- Hold hands with parents when out and about.

The children have their art paper in their bags today and entries can be given to Bea and James at the winter fete. Some of the posters will be made professionally and displayed around camp.

This is super work as those words are tricky to spell and just check out Kusang's handwriting!



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
